



DECISION MAKING

1. Unsatisfactory. Ad hoc and irregular. Poor decisions leading to high risk actions.

- 2. Decisions sometimes reflect poor technique and judgement.
- 3. Satisfactory. Safe and methodical. May not think laterally.
- 4. Accurate and confident. Able to quickly assess a variety of options.
- 5. Excellent. Consistently finds optimal result and readily reviews outcomes.



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
